STUDENTS TURN OUT AT HANDS-ON EXPO IN OAK PARK

LIFE-SAVING EFFORTS RECOGNIZED DURING CEREMONY

John Norling of Carpenter's Local 272 and Cesar De Alba of Laborers' Local 2 were formally recognized for their life-saving measures on behalf of Kevin McLaughlin, an electrician with Lyons-Pinner Electric in Lyons, Illinois.

The ceremony, held at the IBEW Local 134 Hall, was led by CISCO Board Member Gary Misicka, who is President and General Manager of Lyons-Pinner.

Fortunately for McLaughlin, Laborer Cesar De Alba was working in the same room when he was electrocuted. "He had slumped over a pipe below the board he was working on, and his weight was too much for me to pull him off of the pipe, so I called out for someone, and John helped me," De Alba said.

The two men then called 911 and began performing CPR, which kept Kevin alive until the paramedics arrived.

"I never had to do this before," Norling said. "The attention is a bit overwhelming, but it is nice to be recognized. Fortunately it worked out well for Kevin."

Several speakers, including representatives of the American Heart Association, stressed the importance of CPR training, and the need to take action when a crisis occurs.
